
FULLNESS
OF LIFE IN
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Jesus said that he came to give us "life in all its fullness" [John 10:10]. This is at the heart of INF's work.

It's what we long to see becoming a reality in the lives of those we serve. But it's also our motivation for service. It's only out of our own experience of Jesus and the fullness of life that He brings that we can serve effectively [John 15:5].

INF's primary calling is to empower the most marginalised and least served through health and community development that is distinctively shaped by our Christian identity and values.

What does "life in all its fullness" look like for those we serve? How should our Christian identity and values shape our clinical and community work? We want these questions to be at the heart of our thinking, planning, and working over the next five years.





As we prayed, studied God's word together, and planned, the following bible verses came to mind that we believe are significant for INF for the next five years:







OUR ORGANISATION

With God's help we will strive to be an organisation that is at the cutting edge of heralding His Kingdom in all its fullness amongst Nepali people.

We want to be an organisation that effectively blends Nepali and international cultures, perspectives, and people as a visible sign of His worldwide Church. We recognise the need for change in our organisation. Over the next five years we will strive to:

- Strengthen our identity as a Christian mission
- Develop leadership at all levels of the organisation
- Improve the quality of our technical work through the support of specialist advisors
- Become more creative, innovative and responsive to change
- Improve our human resource practices to ensure the productivity and development of staff at all levels. This includes implementing annual reviews and personal development plans, increasing the representation of women and underprivileged groups in senior posts and the development of management training and internship programmes





OUR COMMUNITY WORK

INF empowers poor communities to lift themselves out of poverty. We use a tried and tested approach that enables communities to continue making significant improvements to their lives, long after INF support finishes. We will continue to use this empowering approach, recognising the significant changes affecting the vulnerable communities that we work with. These include the extension of new road, electricity, and phone networks into remote areas, migration, and rural depopulation.

We want to increase our focus on helping vulnerable communities to build their resilience to natural disasters, partly as a result of the recent earthquakes but also because of a predicted increase in flooding and landslides as a result of global warming.





We help people with disability to live healthy and fulfilled lives in their communities. Our future work will have a stronger focus on empowerment; helping people with disability to organise and lobby effectively for their rights so that they can access services from government and other agencies. We will develop a significant new project supporting people with disabilities affected by the recent earthquakes and will begin a new strand of work encouraging Nepali churches to support people with disability in their fellowships and communities. We will continue to support individuals, particularly those we have cared for in our hospital or clinics, using a range of medical, social and economic approaches.

Much of our community work takes place in areas with a very limited church presence. We will encourage and support our Christian staff in these areas to play an active role in their local church communities.





OUR CLINICAL WORK We believe that God is calling us in faith to provide centres of excellence and training in disability and rehabilitation with a strong Christian ethos.

Nepal's hospital sector is steadily improving but there are still significant gaps in care, including in disability and stigmatising illnesses. We will continue to provide care for people with leprosy and spinal chord injuries while developing new specialist services in physical rehabilitation, obstetric fistula, ear diseases / deafness and palliative care.



We face significant financial challenges in our clinical work; care is often expensive because hospital stays are lengthy while clinical work is becoming less of a priority for many donors. And yet, the recent earthquakes highlight just how much this care is needed. INF is already playing an important role in rehabilitation of people who have been disabled by the earthquakes and we want to develop the capacity of our medical teams to respond to future disasters.

Achieving this vision will not be easy and will require significant changes including more flexible and efficient ways of working, charging for some services to allow us to provide free services to the poorest, increasing the financial return on our land and building assets, diversifying clinical services and concerted and new approaches to fundraising both locally and internationally.





We want our clinics to offer holistic care that's shaped by our Christian identity and values, including provision of counselling and the offer of prayer for healing. This will require our work to be staffed by doctors and senior medical staff who share our faith and vision.

We want to increase our focus on training so that doctors, hospitals and health-care professionals across Nepal are better able to meet the needs of people with disability.

We plan to continue to provide services in our clinical centres in Pokhara, Surkhet and Nepalgunj. We will hand over our clinical work in Jumla to the local hospital but provide ongoing support for leprosy services for as long as needed.





INF SANJAAL

INF Sanjaal [meaning 'network' in Nepali'] is an INF team that supports partner organisations who share INF's vision and mission.

- Our Faith@Work programme will mobilise and equip the growing number of Christian Nepali professionals to be effective in serving their communities and their country—in charitable, government, business, arts and other sectors.
- Our Strategic Partnerships Programme
 will second technical experts to support
 the development of Nepal's health and
 education sectors. We are particularly
 excited by the opportunity that INF has
 to play a lead role in the development
 of palliative and pastoral care services
 in Nepal.

- Our NGO Support Programme will help Christian NGOs to play an effective role in serving their communities and wider Nepali society.
- Our Diaspora Initiative will reduce the vulnerability of migrants to exploitation, and support effective advocacy when they encounter difficulties.
